


SNOW COVERED SERENITY: KASHMIR'S TRANQUIL WINTER ESCAPES

Resorts now provide diverse activities such as winter hiking, snowshoeing, ice climbing, and cultural experiences that ensure tourist engagement regardless of snow conditions.

In 2023, the sector generated 41.8 million overnight stays, with a remarkable 9.4% increase in foreign visitor nights. Economic sustainability is achieved through multiple strategies. Destinations have developed wellness centers, cultural experiences, and summer tourism offerings that complement winter activities. For instance, many alpine resorts now feature world class facilities, conference centers and cultural museums that attract visitors throughout the year. The hospitality sector has adapted by creating flexible infrastructure that can be easily transformed between winter and summer configurations. Switzerland's winter tourism model represents more than just a tourism strategy; it is a comprehensive approach to sustainable mountain destination management. By integrating technological innovation, environmental consciousness and adaptive economic strategies, the country has created a global benchmark that other alpine destinations seek to emulate.
